A Year to Celebrate

If you ask any of us at CEC what was most important about 2021-2022, the response will undoubtedly be the same - competitions, competitions, competitions! From the incredible performances by Sean McColl and Alannah Yip at the Olympics, to our National Team athletes showing well on the World Cup circuit, to the addition of paraclimbing athletes to our international events, to full season of comps in Canada for the first time in two years, there is much to celebrate.



Let's begin with huge congratulations to Sean and Alannah for such strong showings at the first ever appearance of climbing in the Olympic Games. Their performances were inspiring, and just as importantly, they were incredible ambassadors for Canada. We also need to recognize the leadership and hard work of our high performance director and Olympic coach, Andrew Wilson, who was key to ensuring our participation in the Olympics was successful. We learned so much from the Olympic experience and are translating that to improved high performance programs, grass roots development and preparation for Paris 2024 and Los Angeles 2028.

Of course, 2021-2022 saw us return to climbing competitions in Canada. Even with COVID capacity restrictions, we hosted a full season of CEC comps, including the largest ever field of athletes in the Senior Boulder event. I want to recognize everyone involved – all those athletes who came out and competed, CEC staff and volunteers, route setters, coaches and officials, our partner gyms and sponsors, and parents and athlete supporters alike. You all made it seem like there had never been a pause in competitions.

This report highlights our accomplishments this year: improving our funding, launching judge training, adding Arc'teryx as our flagship sponsor, building a staffing model and team, opening a national training centre, and much more. Perhaps most importantly, the support of and involvement with stakeholders from all areas of the climbing community – like those I mentioned above – continues to make the biggest difference for CEC's success. Without all of you, none of what you read in this report could have happened.

The pillars of the strategic plan we created in 2021 will remain the foundational priorities this year. You will see us continue the work we started on our membership model and approach to achieve **financial sustainability**. We will never give up in our efforts to continue to build **partnerships and integrate** with diverse stakeholders while maintaining two-way dialogue, and ongoing **engagement and communication** with our community. Finally, we will build our **performance pathway** even further, with a focus on coaching development, a safe, inclusive sporting environment, and continued Olympic preparation.

While huge progress has been made, there is much more to do. Nonetheless, I am inspired by the passion, partnership and persistence shown by our collective community and know that, although there will always be ups and downs, we will continue to see impressive progress and achievements in 2022 – 2023.

With a strong team aboard the CEC, we lead the way through a relaunch of our activities and events, as well as strengthened support to our athletes and stakeholders.

It all started with the launch of a new series, the North American Cup Series, in partnership with USA Climbing. CEC successfully held two events in 2021, both under the pressure of COVID – masks, social distancing, so much sanitizer... Despite the ongoing concerns and the risks to our community, we were able to host these events safely. How amazing it was to finally meet so many of you in person! Having started with CEC at the onset of the pandemic, the 2021 NACS events were my first in-person appearance as your Executive Director. What a blessing it was!

The 2021-2022 Competitive Season marked our return to full-steam ahead. We held all planned events, with the exception of the Youth Regional Championships. It was also the first year that CEC combined Boulder and Lead disciplines into one single event for the Youth divisions. That was quite the undertaking: 5 competition days and over 300 unique participants! What a show!

With the amazing support of Sport Canada and Arc’teryx, our flagship partners, CEC was able to support our High Performance Athletes in ways we have never done before, both logistically and financially. The 2022 IFSC season was the start to an enhanced High Performance Program, and the beginning of great things for Canada on the international stage! With our debut in the Olympic Games now behind us, and our first ever Olympians being crowned, we are now gearing toward Paris 2024, and many great performances by Canada!

All these successes were the product of hard work by our incredible staff, dedicated Board of Directors, and amazing volunteers and stakeholders. The last year has seen a rise in representation, with a record 10 provinces and territories now attending our regular monthly meetings, working together to strengthen our sport structure in Canada. This makes me so happy and proud – seeing the community come together in ways we have not achieved before. I, for one, am looking forward to what we will achieve in the years to come!

CEC was able to support athletes at World Cup events in 2022 like never before. And our athletes responded. This was one of our most successful World Cup campaigns ever and has shown the emerging depth of talent that we have. To be sure, there have been bumps along the way, but that is the nature of progress.

2022 has been an important season for learning how to be together again. The pandemic caused us to build routines around being on our own. As exciting as it has been to be around friends, teammates and people again, it has challenged these routines and asked us to reset how we operate.

Creating opportunities for transfer of skills


Joining the CEC in April 2022, my goal was simple, offer team members as many opportunities as possible to deliver the best team results during the competition

season. A big part of achieving this goal was to organize in-season training activities for our team members, and to collaborate with other federations on some training camps.

Creating a training environment where athletes can learn from one another enables the growth in an individual's skill set; alone, an athlete can strengthen the skills they already have, but together, other skills can be transferred from one to another, enabling athletes to perform at a much higher standard.

As the season progressed, the results were encouraging that we have chosen a good path forward. As a Nation, we finished the bouldering season in 13th place, and are currently sitting comfortably 12th in lead, and 14th in speed, with 1 event left in the season. We had more semi-finalists in both disciplines than any other year in the past.

As we start preparing for next season, I look forward to continue offering athletes opportunities to grow and feel supported as they aim on delivering even better results, with a top 10 National rank as the team target in each discipline.
